Milwaukee County War Memorial Commemorates the 75th Anniversary of the end of WWII

On January 10, 2019, the Congress of the U.S. approved the "75th Anniversary of the End of World War Two Act." The bill directs the Department of Defense to thank the vets of the war, educate the public about the war, recognize the contributions of those at home and abroad, and to remember the Holocaust. The Milwaukee County War Memorial Center has been planning for this celebration for quite some time and we are excited to announce our calendar of events.

The luncheon scheduled for May 7, with Historian John Gurda, has been postponed.

On May 8, we will join countries the world over in ringing the church bells at 1:00PM local time commemorating the Victory in Europe (VE Day).

May 22 to 26, 2,500 miniature American Flags will be on display on the War Memorial grounds.

July 30, our Annual VetFest will go on as planned. Think of this as SummerFest with a heavy dose of patriotism. Lots of food and music available for all citizens, but special emphasis is on our vets.

September 1 to 3, we are honored to have the only exact replica of the Washington D.C. WWII Monument, and it will be on display that week on the Plaza overlooking Lake Michigan.

September 2 will be our signature event, the Victory Street Celebration Dinner.

The National World War II Memorial, which honors the spirit and sacrifice of the 16 million men and women who served overseas and the more than 400,000 that perished, opened to the public in April 2004. The memorial, built to celebrate the heroes of the Greatest Generation, remains one of the most visited sites on the National Mall, with more than 4.2 million visits in 2014. Each year, more than 300 Honor Flights bring World War II veterans, as well as those who served in the Korean and Vietnam wars, to the memorials dedicated to their service.

Burial Flag Information

In response to recent untimely passing of two former soldiers and full time civilians of the 84th Division; I have been asked to provide information concerning the receipt of a burial flag for Army Reservists.

I have attached a Veterans Benefits Administration information sheet that provides information; however, there is some clarification needed; as the information sheet only states that eligibility is open to "Certain former members of the Selected Reserves".

What does this mean? Let me try to explain.

Someone who has completed at least one enlistment as a member of the Selected Reserve or in the case of an officer, completed the initial period of obligated service.

Was discharged before completion of the person's initial enlistment or period of initial obligation for a disability incurred in or aggravated in the line of duty.

Died while a member of the Selected Reserve

Was eligible for retirement and died before reaching age 60

The problem most face when asked is to provide proof of service when discharged from the Army Reserve since a DD214 is not usually issued.

A Reserve soldier will receive a DD214 for periods of Active Duty Training (ADT) or Active Duty for Training (ACDUTRA). Unfortunately these documents are not sufficient proof for completion of one enlistment or period of obligated service. Unless you were activated under Title 10 or enlisted on Active Duty (AD); you will not receive a DD214 that shows you qualify.

The National Guard receives a NGB Form 22 upon discharge that is not the case with an Army Reservist. Traditionally, Reservists are issued an order transferring them to the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR). When I retired, I was issued such an order; transferring me to the Retired Reserve. Upon turning age 60, I received a Certificate of Retirement (suitable for framing); but no DD214. Those were only issued for completion of Active Duty under Title 10 and for ADT over 180 days.

What does this mean? It is critical for you to maintain your military records if you are what is called a "traditional" reserve soldier. The transfer order for completion of service or retirement is your proof of service needed for the receipt of a burial flag. It is critical that documents are in order upon your death to ease the burden on those preparing for your burial.

Why Does VA Provide a Burial Flag?

A United States flag is provided to drape the casket of a deceased Veteran. The flag is provided at no cost. It is intended to honor the memory of a Veteran who served honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces. VA furnishes a burial flag for the following Veterans who received other than dishonorable discharge:

- Veterans who served during wartime
- Veterans who died on active duty after May 27, 1941
- Veterans who served after Jan. 31, 1955
- Peacetime Veterans who were discharged or released before June 27, 1950
- Certain people who served in the organized military forces of the Commonwealth of the Philippines while in service of the U.S. Armed Forces o Must have died on or after April 25, 1951
 - Certain former members of the Selected Reserves

Who Is Eligible to Receive the Burial Flag?

After the funeral service, the flag is given to the next-of-kin as a keepsake. When there is no next-of-kin, VA will give the flag to a friend who requests it. For VA national cemeteries with an Avenue of Flags, you can donate the flag to be flown on patriotic holidays.

How Can You Apply?

Complete VA Form 27-2008, "Application for United States Flag for Burial Purposes" to apply. You can find the form at https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-27-2008- ARE.pdf. VA regional benefit offices and some post offices are the primary issuing points for burial flags. You can find your closest regional benefit office by visiting https://www.benefits.va.gov/benefits/offices.asp. Please note, not all local post offices have burial flags on hand. Call and confirm with your local post office in advance.

Can a Burial Flag Be Replaced?

According to law, VA can issue only one flag for a Veteran's funeral. It cannot be replaced if lost, destroyed or stolen. However, some organizations or community groups may be able to help you get another flag.

How Should the Burial Flag Be Displayed?

This depends on whether the casket is open or closed. VA Form 27-2009 (https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-27-2008-ARE.pdf) provides the correct method for displaying and folding. The burial flag is not suitable for outside display. This is due to its size and fabric. The cotton can easily be damaged by weather.
